# LITTLE INTEREST IN LIVESTOCK PRICE INSURANCE

In early March, Saskatchewan agriculture minister David Marit said Livestock Price Insurance may soon become a national program. However, the percentage of ranchers and cattle producers who use the program is relatively low on the Prairies.

#### **MANITOBA**

In 2022-23, Manitoba producers purchased 198 livestock price insurance policies. The total insurance coverage was \$25.5 million, with no indemnities.

In 2021-22, total coverage was \$20 million with \$175,000 paid out in claims.

**SASKATCHEWAN** 

The number of producers enrolled in Livestock Price Insurance crept higher from 2018-19 to 2022-23, going from 3,100 to about 3,800. However, the number of policies declined, dropping from 1,700 in 2018-19 to 611 in 2022-23.

Participation in feeder price insurance was steady from 2018-19 to 2022-23 at about 3.5 to five percent of the herd.

To track participation in calf price insurance, SCIC compares the portion of the calf crop that is insured during the February to June period to the total marketable calf crop in the province.
